

COMMUNITY GROUPS

A group of community members who come together to share ideas, organize, and work together to positively affect the neighborhood. Members can include residents, business owners, and local organizations within a neighborhood. By forming a neighborhood group, neighbors create a unified purpose around a common set of goals. These groups are open to both homeowners and renters who reside in the neighborhoods.





types of GROUPS

NEIGHBORHOOD GROUP A voluntary group of neighbors who act as one to preserve and improve their neighborhood. This group may choose to respond to concerns or provide input to county processes that provide benefits and improvement to their neighborhood.

NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION A neighborhood association is formalized by creating the following documents: mission, values, and by-laws. These groups often have a formalized leadership structure within the group and possibly accept dues to support community events.

HOMEOWNERS ASSOCIATIONS (HOAs) A non-voluntary group of homeowners who live by a set of bylaws and regulations. HOAs are often initially established by a developer to help maintain the quality of a neighborhood and pay for additional infrastructure improvements. These groups pay a monthly fee and usually meet regularly.

what can

COMMUNITY GROUPS DO?





CONNECT: Create groups through social media to discuss and participate in neighborhood forums. NextDoor and Facebook groups are good options.

ENGAGE: Participate in Town Halls, Public Hearings, and other community meetings the county holds.

View the calendar of events.

EVENTS: Build community by hosting bake sales, fun runs, clean-up days, or other creative activities that encourage everyone to socialize.

PLAN: Collaborate with the county to develop a tailored neighborhood plan that reflects local needs and goals.

SAFETY: Work together to enhance community safety, share concerns, and explore strategies for improving the neighborhood.

RESILIENT NEIGHBORHOODS

program

The Resilient Neighborhoods Program provides a structured framework for neighborhood groups in Adams County to connect, collaborate, and build relationships with the county. The program welcomes all neighborhood groups, from newly forming to well-established, interested in working together with the county at any level.

INDIVIDUAL INTEREST

If there is no active group in your area, Adams County can help you start your own!

NEIGHBORHOOD GROUP PHASES

This program is structured in phases to ensure all groups, regardless of their level of development, can access the tools and support they need to thrive and make a lasting impact in their communities.

- Building Phase: Emerging neighborhood groups focused on growing membership, setting collective goals, and organizing initial efforts, with the option to work toward official registration with Adams County.
 - ▶ Benefits for Building Phase Groups: Access to facilitated strategic planning sessions to help define group goals and grow membership
- Partnership Phase: Established neighborhood groups with regular participation, meetings, and activities aimed at defined objectives, officially registered with Adams County. These groups gain access to all formal resources and benefits of the Resilient Neighborhoods Program.
 - ▶ Benefits for Partnership Phase Groups: County promotion of the group's meetings and initiatives; Collaboration with various Adams County departments; Opportunities for leadership development and networking with other neighborhoods.







NEIGHBORHOOD COMMUNITY

fund program

Participating in the Resilient Neighborhoods Program provides valuable resources and support to help neighborhoods build strong, connected communities. One key resource is the Neighborhood Community Fund, which offers financial support to residents in Adams County for projects and activities that enhance community resilience and connection within neighborhoods.

Funding Categories

- □ **Community Event:** Supports neighborhood and community gatherings, such as block parties, clean-up events, or other activities that build connections among residents.
 - ► Funding Available: Up to \$400
 - Examples of Potential Uses: Food, non-alcoholic drinks, activity supplies, or clean-up materials.
- **Neighborhood Experience:** Supports larger-scale neighborhood events, such as festivals, sports tournaments, workout classes, volunteer workdays, fun runs, and concerts.
 - ► Funding Available: Up to \$800.
 - ▶ Examples of Potential Uses: Supplies for the event, permitting fees, printed items, promotional materials, etc.
- □ **Capacity Building & Organizing:** Supports the development and formalization of neighborhood groups and grassroots initiatives to strengthen community leadership and ensure long-term sustainability.
 - ► Funding Available: Up to \$1,000
 - ▶ Examples of Potential Uses: Costs related to registering as a 501(c)(3) organization, professional or leadership development (e.g., training through the Colorado Nonprofit Association or similar resources), website development, meeting space reservations, and other organizing needs.
- Neighborhood Project: Supports neighborhood projects that address community needs and provide lasting benefits, such as community gardens, Little Free Libraries, or enhancing shared community spaces.
 - ► Funding Available: Up to \$3,000
 - Examples of Potential Uses: Materials, permit fees, and other expenses necessary for project implementation.

how to

START YOUR GROUP



While neighborhood groups can take many forms, this checklist offers a simple approach to help you get started. As your group grows, you may explore becoming a more established neighborhood association or even a nonprofit organization. However, these formal processes are not necessary to become a recognized neighborhood group. Use the Getting Started Checklist and the following pages to guide your initial organizing process and first meeting.



- Gather a group of interested neighbors and complete the <u>Building Phase Neighborhood Group</u> <u>Contact Form.</u>
- Schedule an initial meeting at a convenient time and place where residents are invited to introduce themselves, discuss neighborhood interests, and brainstorm ideas.
- □ Promote the group's first meeting through flyers, social media posts, or door-to-door invitations. Spread the word to ensure diverse representation from across the neighborhood.
- Meet the neighbors and your broader community. Are there any neighborhood businesses or organizations that can support or engage with your group?

Once your neighborhood group has reached the Building Phase, keep the momentum going! Use this checklist to guide your neighborhood group as you transition to the **Partnership Phase** of the Resilient Neighborhoods Program:

Grow Membership

- ▶ Recruit more neighbors to actively participate in meetings, events, and activities.
- ▶ Build a diverse group of residents to represent your neighborhood.
- ▶ Identify a main contact and a secondary contact to serve as liaisons for the group to the county, to ensure sustainability and consistency in communication.

□ Define Goals and Objectives

- ▶ Work with your group to establish clear, actionable goals that address neighborhood needs. Adams County can support by facilitating strategic planning sessions to define these goals. For more information about these sessions, contact the Community Resilience Coordinator Neighborhoods at sparc@adcogov.org.
- Document your goals to share with members and use as a roadmap for your activities.

Organize Regular Meetings

- ▶ Schedule consistent group meetings (monthly or quarterly) to discuss goals, plan activities, and address neighborhood concerns.
- ▶ Keep records of meeting agendas and minutes to maintain transparency.




RIVERDALE ANIMAL SHELTER:


